Standardized Testing

For further clarification...

The WrAP (Writing Assessment Program) is an assessment provided by the ERB (Educational Records Bureau) organization. The WrAP is composed of two, onehour sessions given over two days. A prompt, along with suggestions for writing the prompt, is provided the day of the assessment.

The CTP (Comprehensive Testing Program) is a rigorous assessment for high achieving students that is also provided by the ERB.

Although we have been focusing on specific skills, concepts, and strategies to strengthen test-taking abilities, the month of April will be devoted to additional conditioning for the assessments.

Writer's Workshop

Focus: ERB Test Prep

The students have now completed and discussed five of the seven practice ERB assessments: Verbal Reasoning, Vocabulary, Reading Comprehension, Writing Mechanics, and Writing Concepts and Skills. Please look for these practices assessments in the Friday Folder. We will continue our test prep reviews, assessments, and discussions this week.

Word Study - Sort 14 was cast aside. Yes, test prep is our focus. There is a good chance Sort 14 may reappear this week. The quiz will not be given this week.

Weekly Writing - I am not assigning any weekly writing due to the WrAP. The students have been working very hard on becoming better writers. I am proud of the progress they've made since the beginning of the school year. They do not need to be pushed any harder this week. My hope is that each writer will put forth the time and effort to plan, craft, revise, and edit their WrAP in such a way that truly reflects the writing instruction this year. Please ask your child if he/she feels like he/she has grown as a writer this year and what it takes to be a good writing.
