Writer's Workshop

Writers wrote their Small Moment On-Demand piece last week. At the beginning of every writing unit, students are given a prompt and instructions for writing to that prompt. Ondemand writing informs our instruction and shows how our students are growing as writers.

The students will be given Grammar packets of exercises for review, to zero in on problem areas, and to introduce new concepts. We will grade the packets together and review. Quizzes covering the concepts and skills in the packets will be given periodically.

Word Study - Sort 1 was provided last week. The sentences were due on Thursday. We will discuss and review the "Noticings" on Monday, review on Tuesday, and the quiz will be on Wednesday.

Weekly Writing - The weekly writing assignment for this week is a "Free Write." The students may choose any topic which "calls their name." The goal is to write a well developed piece. It should be a minimum of five paragraphs. It should include a hook (a way to capture their reader's attention), an introduction, and a conclusion that wraps up the story and/or shares the author's message.

Laptop Mania

Social studies took a hit this week! Since I was asked every day "When are we getting on our laptops?"... we got on the laptops. We reviewed the rules and guidelines for laptop use and got started on Type to Learn. I will give the students the code and information for downloading TTL on home computers this week.

The last lesson, Lesson 8, will be taught Math on Monday. We will review on Tuesday and Wednesday. The Unit 1 Math Assessment will be given on Thursday The Open Response will be given on Friday. Students should be able to: *Trace and name specific polygons *Correctly draw and name lines, rays, line *Identify shapes that are not polygons and segments, and angles *Understand the concepts of perpendicular, parallel, concave, convex, and congruent explain why

Reader's Workshop

Readers shared their favorite Summer Reading fiction book and their nonfiction inquiry jottings. It was a great book review "fest" and an entertaining array of nonfiction topics! We all learned something!

Because it can be difficult to talk about a book without summarizing the story, the students brainstormed specific literary words to use for the "The Language of Readers and Writers" word bank. In order to embrace the use of these words, the students referenced the word bank as they wrote a review for a favorite chapter book, underlining each word they lifted from the bank. Using specific language helps readers collaborate more effectively and write responses that are more developed.
