## Writer's Workshop

## Focus: Dialogue/Punctuation Study

Last week, we focused on including meaningful dialogue tags that help to "show not tell." We also added subordinating conjunctions to our repertoire. Yes, we did the AAAWWUBBIS Whoop! (A-WOOO-BIS)... a punctuation lesson on adding commas after introductory elements in a complex sentence. Many students are already writing this type of sentence. We also refer to these sentences as having "openers." The mnemonic stands for the words (after, although, as, when, while, until, before, because, if, and since) that signal potential comma work.

Word Study - Sort 7 will be provided after the holiday.

Weekly Writing - "Creepy" is due on Tuesday. The piece should reflect the dialogue and punctuation work we've focused on over the last several weeks. Writers need to read their stories out loud and print out drafts to make it easier to locate those areas that need to be edited, revised, and further developed. I am looking forward to reading these exciting cliffhangers!

## Social Studies

After reading about and discussing the Lost Colony of Roanoke using several resources, the students were asked to develop their theory on what happened to the colony. Each junior historian chose a theory and wrote an essay on why they thought this particular theory was the most logical reason for the colonists disappearance.
